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Worship Calendar

April's Liturgical Theme: Resurrection

April 5th – "Transformed and Transforming Faith" Rev. Anya Sammler-Michael provides our service based on the theme designated by Bryan George. Bryan purchased the sermon at the auction in November of 2008. We will peer deeply into the nature of the Unitarian Universalist faith asking ourselves, "Will this faith be here in 25 years, and if so, what will it look like?" A hymn sing will begin our service at 10:20 and an inquirer's class will follow at noon.

April 12th - "Natural, Infinite, Yes" Rev. Anya Sammler-Michael leads this all-ages Easter service. With the help of an EE Cummings poem, she will ask, "What is resurrection and who was Jesus of Nazareth?" And the UUS choir will perform!

April 19th - "Will You be Passed Over?" Rev. Anya Sammler-Michael and the UUS choir provide this service. The season of Passover begins on April 9th and finishes on the 15th. The name of this ancient holiday recollects a divine promise to the Israelites. In this time of economic instability, will we be passed over or will we feel the wrath of hardship?

April 26th - "Credo" A credo is a belief statement that encompasses what a person values and how they find meaning. What do you believe? The Building your own Theology Class has entertained this very question since last autumn. On this Sunday they will share their journey and invite further reflections.

What YOU Can Do!

RE registration and volunteer sign up for 2009-2010 will begin during the Volunteer Fest on April 19. There are many opportunities to serve your congregation and contribute to the ministry of children's RE. Consider what you can do to ensure a meaningful program for the children and help build the multi-age community at UUS. These are a few of the possibilities:

RE Committee Member – The committee meets once a month to plan and implement the work necessary to make the congregation's vision for religious exploration a reality. Anyone interested in RE at UUS is welcome. Especially needed are people with skills in organization, group facilitation, writing, creating and maintaining web pages, or planning events, and people who enjoy interacting with and contacting other people.

Summer RE Leader or Assistant – Lead or assist one or more Sundays during the summer. Leaders will receive lesson plans with all of the information necessary to lead the class. Assistants just need to show up on Sunday morning and help watch the children. One leader and one assistant are needed for each of 12 summer sessions beginning on June 21st and ending on September 6th.

Leaders for 2009-2010 – Lead a class at least once a month in September through June. Lesson plans are provided and the DRE is available if you have questions, need help getting resources, or would like additional ideas. Children benefit from consistency, so consider leading more than once a month!

Assistants for 2009-2010 – Assist in a class once a month in September through June or a few Sundays throughout the year. You will help with setup and cleanup before and after the class and help supervise children during the class. Simply being present during the class is the most crucial part of this job.

Nursery Assistants – Help watch children during the service once a month.

Other opportunities include substituting in children's RE or the nursery, helping arrange child care for special events, planning or helping with children's activities during special events, driving on field trips, or sharing your knowledge about or interest in a religion, culture, or holiday. The Unitarian Universalist Association holds elections every four years for two positions: UUA President (currently Rev. William Sinkford) and UUS Moderator (currently Gini Courter). Rev. Sinkford is completing his second term and cannot, according to UUA by-laws, run again. Gini is eligible to run for a second term; she is currently unopposed.

The election will be held at General Assembly this June in Salt Lake City. We cannot vote as individuals, but we can, as a congregation, instruct our delegates how to vote. We will send two voting delegates to GA.

Two candidates are running for the office of UUA President: the Rev. Dr. Laurel Hallman and Rev. Peter Morales. They both have many years of active participation in our denomination at the local, regional, and national levels. They are both passionate about the need for growing Unitarian Universalism, in the need for that growth to come from expanding our congregations, and in a renewed partnership with the UUSC and an increase in our social activism. There are differences in their approaches. This election will make a difference in the future of our denomination; the approach of the UUA President will guide us for the next four years. Where do you want UUs to be, and how do you want us to grow over the next four vears?

In keeping with our fifth principle, promoting the use of the democratic process, we should be informed about the positions of the two candidates. Old Business: Additional Space: Dave has received a proposal from our landlord for the new space. It is a little higher than we were hoping for, but manageable. There is still negotiation for the build-out.

Long-Range Plan Update: All cottage conversations have been held. The Strategic Planning Committee will meet on March 19 to review the results and discuss the form they wish the final report to take. A draft will be prepared for the May 17annual meeting.

Stewardship Campaign Status: Stewardship Visitor training was held on February 21. Planning for Leadership Dinner and Congregation Kick-off Party on track. Funds would be available for three paid child-care workers.

AAFCJ tenant issues: Dave and Rev. Anya held a meeting last week with their pastor. Linda said the conditions were better this past week. Dave wants to give them a note each week with our evaluation: the good and bad news. ESL classes are going well. We have a lot of volunteers and they have a lot of interest. They will be conducting Spanish classes for UUSers who wish to attend.

Space rental by girls' chorus: Summer camp is set for two weeks this summer. We need more information to evaluate the request for Monday sessions beginning in the fall. Lori will contact the woman requesting our space.

New Business: Board members need to read their emails each day. To make it easier to know which ones require

action, "Action Required" will be included in the subject line. "Urgent" will indicate email that should be read but may not require a response.

JPD Conference: Scheduled for April 24-26 in Wilmington. Dave and Susan Miller and Paul Roche are going. The Sunday workshop on Social Justice will be attended by Cathy Tucker. It would be good to have another member attend.

Audio system issues: Some Sundays cables are unplugged and settings on the mixer have been changed. The cables are a mess; the area needs to be reconfigured to be neater and easier to troubleshoot. Cables should be labeled and a diagram of the settings should be included in the new users' guide. Scott will work with Bryan to write a users' guide for setup and troubleshooting. It will include instructions for podcasting.

The new space should have sound in the nursery. If possible, the wires (ours and our tenants) should be run through the walls.

Annual meeting: Annual meeting is May 17. Board member and committee reports to be submitted to Jeff by April 1. A by-law change for the committee on ministry selection process will be submitted.

Social Action: The Rebuilding Together organization has selected April 25 for this year's activity. Ken Ward is the lead. Linda Reeder will contact Leesburg and Accotink to see if they would like to team with us on a house.

Summer Intern: Katrina Thralls will work approximately 5 hours/week this summer helping Rev. Anya and seeing what the work of ministry is all about. The board will provide \$500 to further her UU education; attending GA would qualify.

UU Fast Day

Thursday April 16, 2009 Vespers Service at 6:30 Potluck of Soup and Bread to Follow

In the early 17th-century, the Puritan ancestors of the Unitarians and Universalists would observe days of thanksgiving to God whenever a remarkably good thing happened. Whenever a remarkably bad thing happened, the Puritans saw God as punishing them for their wickedness, and therefore called for a day of fasting, prayer, and penitence. By the 18th century, Fast Day and Thanksgiving had emerged as regular, state-sponsored religious holidays across New England. There always would be a fast on a Thursday in April and a thanksgiving on a Thursday in November. These dates corresponded with the local agricultural year. Farmers in effect were asking God's forgiveness and blessing before they planted and giving God thanks after the harvest. People generally behaved in a subdued manner on Fast Davs and refrained from work, but their fasting was not severe. They abstained from food until evening, when they would eat a simple, usually cold, meal. During the day, they would attend one or more religious services. Ministers would preach special Fast Day sermons of admonition and reconciliation (in contrast to the celebratory ones they preached on Thanksgiving). Fast Day was the only occasion when congregations expected their minister to

speak on the sins of the nation; some famous political sermons were preached on Fast Days.

This will be the second annual Fast Day at UU Sterling. All are invited to participate and use the day for reflection – to consider the state of the nation and specifically the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan or the strain and suffering of individuals and families due to the present economic crisis. The day is also a revival of an ancient church practice and a time for spiritual renewal.

All are welcome – adults, children, families, UUSterling participants, and members of the wider community. As you are able, consider bringing either a crock of soup or some bread to share. Contact – Rev. Anya with questions: minister@uusterling.org
