stare at their rainbow rings and swirls. I knew they were beautiful; I didn't look at them and see danger.

Anything in excess is dangerous except love.

And love is helping me to find comfort, as I witness the destruction of the excess of oil that is spilling into our gulf.

I love this congregation, its members, friends and visitors. I love the interconnection that lives in our relationships - how we reach for one another when we are in need, how we are committed to nurturing all the children that call our congregation home. I love this interconnection - the bonds that bind us one to another in shared dependence. I love this interconnection when it reminds me of our strength and our beauty, but especially when it recalls me to my best self again, when I falter or go astray.



animal activists, how some have homes or families on the gulf coast, how some have traveled to New Orleans for rescue efforts, how some own stock in the oil companies, how some work for oil companies, how some work for companies that provide support to the government agencies working to clean up the spill.

I realize this and I love this congregation even more – as it reminds me again and again that this world is astoundingly complex and for that, nothing is solved with easy solutions. Rage is easy. Love is difficult; it is complex, and it is the only way we can move from pain to healing – for ourselves, and for our

precious world.

We need to love this world so much that we will give ourselves to the task of healing – healing relationships broken by anger, healing animals snared by a toxic spill, and healing communities by advocating for compensation for those who will loose their livelihoods. But let us do all of this– understanding that our interconnection is just as holy as our call to justice... as justice rises from acts of love, just as rainbows swirl in pools of oil... unexpected, astounding, beautiful.

Rev Mohrmen will be delivering drawings from the UUS Religious Exploration classes to the children in Kut. This will help weave another strand in our evolving connection.

Rev. Mohrmen encouraged us to see the Khasi Hills Unitarians as brothers and sisters in faith – while pointing out the many beautiful aspects of the Khasi Unitarian religion that grow from their deep traditional culture.

Francis David, a great Transylvanian Unitarian reformer, said: "We do not need to think alike to love alike." It is an honor to be a part of a religious tradition that welcomes participants to seek the truth as their consciences are called, while providing some ethical and theological standards to support spiritual growth and compassionate living. Rev. Mohrmen's visit proclaimed the potential of this religious presentation – a force that can build bridges between souls.

Eco-Tips

Here are some tips on how to reduce the amount of stuff we throw in the trash, and, by extension, our landfills. Instead of drinking bottled water, fill up a reusable water bottle or travel mug and bring it with you. Bottled water is usually no better quality than tap (sometimes worse), and you'll save a lot of money and reduce the amount of plastic you use. (Plus you can add ice to keep it colder!) Bring your travel mug when you want to buy coffee somewhere. Many places, including Starbucks, give you a ten cent discount for bringing your own mug. When grocery shopping, many of us bring our own bags, but you can minimize waste even more. When buying produce, consider whether or not you really need one of those small plastic bags-- a squash or bell pepper does fine without one! (And you can stick the weight/price label right on it, if necessary). If you do need one, bring your own. There are a variety of small reusable bags at reusablebags.com. This site also has great little "wrapping mats" that you can use to wrap sandwiches, veggies, etc. for lunches instead of using a baggie or plastic wrap. Cloth napkins also work-- just tie opposite corners in two knots. Finally if ordering take-out food, tell them not to give you any "extras" that you don't need, i.e. disposable chopsticks, plastic utensils, paper napkins, yet more soy sauce packets... Have a green summer!

Lavonne Luquis earned a journalism degree from the University of Colorado and became an award-winning reporter and editor in her hometown, San Juan, PR. When the newspaper she worked for was sold, and the staff was not told who bought it, she moved thousands of miles to work as city editor at a newspaper near Seattle.

She caught the Internet bug early and co-founded the first Hispanic-focused website in the US. Over the next six years, she hired a wonderful staff, opened offices in San Francisco and New York and thoroughly enjoyed the ride while it lasted. When the Internet bubble burst, she went to work for the University of California. In 2004, she moved to Virginia to work for AOL. In 2006, she went to work for the National Education Association. In 2008, she left the NEA to travel in an RV with her husband. When her husband's health deteriorated, she cared for him until he died.

From those ashes arose a determination to create a life designed to satisfy her desire for meaningful connection, for service, for travel, for joy. One of the first steps on that journey was a trip to Italy. Then a blog chronicling 101 Things Lavonne wants to do in 1001 days. She is enrolled in a Martha Beck Life Coach Training program, and looks forward to building a strong coaching practice in the year ahead.

Finance Report: Paul reviewed the final balance sheet that he will present at the annual meeting next Sunday. Paul sent reminder letters to members with remaining balances of unpaid dues. We have about \$39,000 in the building fund. Starting now, our monthly expenses are about \$20,000 for the coming year. We will need to collect \$16,000/month in pledges to meet our obligations. Paul requested the Arts and Aesthetics expense report no later than June 30.

Old Business:

Space/Facilities/Aesthetics. Delivery date of the new chairs is unknown. A garbage disposal is being purchased and installed. We are talking with the landlord about who will cover the cost to repair the air conditioning. The repair bill was \$850. The Board appointed Dave, Gus, Bonnie and John Boone to resolve. The Board will accept the decision of the appointees.

Website Maintenance. Dave Lum is

doing a great job managing the website. Dave Miller has become the technical lead for audio; Bryan will provide his knowledge and expertise when needed. The Worship Associates will be responsible for the schedule, making sure a sound person is in attendance each Sunday.

AAFCJ. Joan explained that the tenants asked to use the church overnight on June 5 as a 'make up' day for one Sunday last month they did not use their time. There were two days they didn't have services; they will likely ask for another overnight use later in the summer. The Board agreed to allow use as long as the church RE rooms are neat and clean and things are in the same location. They will leave by 8:00 a.m.

Chalice Lighters. Slips filled out during the service were misplaced so anyone wishing to join Chalice Lighters should go to the website.

Chalice Keepers. Paul will coordinate a visit by a representative to explain how this works.

Annual Meeting. Dave Scher will be parliamentarian. Paul will provide actual financials for budget discussion. Alyssa or Al will lead the budget review. Bonnie will ask Wendi to include a reminder about the annual meeting in the weekly announcement. We will use the projector. We will ask that greeters remind everyone of the annual meeting and hand out ballots to members who will not be able to stay for the meeting.

JPD Leadership Weekend is August 26-29. Board members are encouraged to attend.

Concert. A second Mythica concert, set for August 27th, has been cancelled. Any ideas for other bands for a concert should be submitted to the Membership Committee.

New Business:

Church calendar. The next Board meeting, July 7, will be with both old and new members. Dates for fall events will be set at the July meeting.

Communication policy. The Board discussed the use of the UUS Announce list. The Board reviewed the new communication policy. Rev. Anya and

Bonnie will confer with Tammi Marcouli about social media.

Church directory. We will add a note in OOS that if you wish a soft copy of the directory, contact the administrator. A note indicating that the directory is only for church related activities will be added to the directory.

We will not have a Board meeting in August but will have a meeting to plan the church retreat.

Rev Anya will review the staff job descriptions and contracts and send updates to Board so that new contracts may be issued in July.

The Board signed Thank You cards to our building dedication guests.
