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## Summer RE

The children's Religious Exploration theme this summer is "Keepers of the Earth." The emphasis is on having fun while gaining an appreciation of nature. The lesson plans for each Sunday include a Native American story and a variety of activities, including an outdoor option.

Leading or assisting this summer is a great way to get to know a few of the children at UUS, while sharing your own interest in nature, science, the environment, or Native American stories and traditions. You will also get an idea of what the children do in RE and you can prepare to lead or assist regularly by helping with a summer session. One leader and one assistant are needed each Sunday. Leaders receive the lesson plan for their session, but may choose other stories or activities related to the topic. Sign up to lead or assist one, two or three Sundays this summer by contacting Linda Weaver or signing up on the schedule posted in the hall leading to the new kitchen and nursery.

If you have children in the program, return the registration form soon. It includes a release so they can participate in the outdoor activities, if you choose. The form is available at UUS or on the website.

During the summer, UUS offers one RE class for children entering kindergarten through 6th grade. Older children may participate or help in the class or they may attend the entire worship service. Children 13 and older may sign up to assist in the RE class. The nursery is available every Sunday for children 5 or younger.



As a teenager, my family attended a Presbyterian church in a conservative rural community. I loved my farming friends, but felt out of place, especially in the age of enlightenment of the 1970s. Imagine my surprise when our church brought in a young minister who

Membership in a Unitarian Universalist congregation is a rich and fulfilling experience. Congregations who are able to embrace all that it means to be a member are in the best position to ensure that members remain active and contributing parts of the community. What brought you to Unitarian Universalism and your own congregation?

A strong religious education program for children and youth is essential to healthy membership development and retention. With schedules as busy as they are today, families seek activities that they can do together and places that have meaning for them as a family. Excitement and ownership by the youngest members of a family will keep adults coming as well.

**Covenant groups**, affinity groups, supper clubs, neighborhood groups, book clubs, and groups that assist with specific difficult transitions—such as groups for caregivers of elderly parents—can all provide the type of support that will keep members connected to the community. espoused the benefits of equality, diversity and self reflection. I heard a lot of grunts and moans during his sermons and more than a few walked out. But, I was awakened to religion as I had never been before. One Sunday stands out. The congregation from a local Black Baptist church was invited to our service. I was riveted to every word of the joint sermon, entitled the "Black Manifesto", and my heart was overflowing when I saw white and black farmers haltingly shake hands and mumble their thanks for the community get together.

I see similar opportunities for "breaking down walls" at UUS, both figuratively and literally. Will we embrace our neighbors of color? Will we stand up on the side of love for our GLBTQ friends? Will we promote life styles that honor and nurture our earth? I think we can and I will do my part to help.

# Are You a Member?

Our members know that we have **many kinds of theological diversity** in our congregations. Spiritual diversity is based on the differences in what we do—our practices. Our diversity is a blessing, and we encourage our members to explore their own experience with religious practice, with meditation, with understanding what language of the spirit evokes in them.

With a tradition of independent congregations and a long history of outstanding and courageous lay leadership, UU congregations have long understood that membership means involvement. Our ministers share leadership with our lay leaders, albeit not always without some uneasiness. When the idea of shared ministry was introduced to our congregations in the 1990s, it gave a vocabulary for what we have long believed: that a congregation will only be successful if its members give of their time, money, and talents and if that ministry is more than what the professional minister does.

#### **Committee Liaison Reports:**

**Finance Report:** We received the Chalice Lighter grant for \$20,000 for the current church year. The budget is in good shape.

#### Old Business:

**New Space. Facilities/Aesthetics:** We are hoping to get a partial shipment of the new chairs for May 22. The bathroom doors have been fixed. We still have things in storage behind Feather Heads that need to be stored within our facility. There are dividers that can be stored upstairs. We decided to table ordering special lighting and additional microphones until June. Also in June, we will discuss building a platform for the sanctuary.

**Building Dedication:** Invitations were issued. Dorine's committee met and all plans are made. There will be two food setups. Food will be finger foods and not be served on the carpet. It will not be a full dinner. We will be able to pay for platters for \$30 starting on Sunday. There will be a charge of \$10 for Broadway Night if you didn't get this auction item. Setup will begin at noon. Volunteers for cleanup will be needed.

Website Maintenance: Dave Lum is handling the website. Brian is still audio lead and interested in transitioning. Dave Lum will be the sound technical lead and we will ask Worship Associates to arrange volunteers for handling the sound system. **AAFJ:** Joan will meet with Lubia and Nathan on Thursday to discuss exchanging two days for other days. There should always be an adult with the children. Can use all spaces, but little kids cannot be in the youth room; they should be in the carpeted room.
