What Will Become of our New Space -Raising a Temple Rev. Anya Sammler-Michael

Kenneth Patton, the storied Universalist minister of the mid-20th Century wrote:

"We have been

warned against leaving the temples of our upbringing, but we have discovered that every temple in which men and women have worshiped is also our temple, if we enter it with the spirit of our common search for goodness of life."

Dear community, many of us have left the temples of our upbringing whether those were temples of stained glass and icons or temples of purely rational thought. Many of us have dared enter new temples – have traded the usual for the universal, the common for the transcendent.

And now we are in the business of temple raising. So let's define what sort of temple we hope to raise. The walls are there, the ceiling, the paint, the carpet, and the tile. We have defined the space – with what shall we fill it? I don't mean artifacts or art work though I hope that any we choose will support and sustain our vision. What I mean is intention – what love, what hope, what spirit will we use to raise our temple? It

is intention that makes four walls a place of worship. It is intention that makes a community a congregation. It is intention that makes our new space a temple.

I spent a few hours a few weeks back with a group of congregants who were helping move our office furniture upstairs into the new office loft. There were grunts and groans. There were items removed from one space that had to be replaced. There were plenty of ideas of where the furniture should go. There were cut fingers. There were hurt backs. And there was laughter. There was joy. There were three generations sharing the labor. There were accolades. And after all of it, there was pizza.

As Ken Patton says – "We have discovered that every temple in which men and woman have worshiped is also our temple, if we enter it with the spirit of our common search." What he means is tied to what our crew of movers experienced – that we will have different ideas about where the copier should go, but if we take the time to listen, speak our hearts, then listen again, not only will the copier find its "rightful" place, but we will as well – among one another, in community, with love.



Love Can Hurt

The children begin every Religious Exploration session by lighting their chalice. On February 14 one child asked about this. I explained that the chalice is a symbol of Unitarian Universalism and that one may think of the bowl as holding all Unitarian Universalists in our congregation and the world and the flame as the love we share. It was quickly pointed out that the flame in the RE chalice is fake, coming as it does from a battery-powered candle. After an adult explained that this is for safety, another child commented, "love can hurt."

Yes indeed, love can hurt and love can even be dangerous. This was an especially fitting connection to make as we considered the meaning of "Standing on the Side of Love" this Valentine's Day. To explore the meaning of these words, I invited the children to identify the genders they think of in relation to various colors, clothing, pasttimes, and occupations. The children easily identified the assumptions our society teaches. When encouraged to reconsider each of these assumptions, they readily accepted and often enthusiastically pointed out the fallacy of the stereotypes. However, they also talked

about the difficulty of not following some of these expectations and the dangers of supporting another person who does not follow gender stereotypes.

Standing on the side of love sounds simple and it sounds like something everyone would embrace. However, it can be very difficult and painful. Unitarian Universalists have long realized this. We have a history of providing support to each other in the scary and difficult attempt to build a world that is fairer and kinder to everyone. In Religious Exploration at UUS we continue this work by providing an accepting and supportive community where all people can discover their own strengths, their own beliefs, and their own paths. We strive to build a nurturing place where all people are appreciated for who they are and all people can build up the courage and resolve to stand up for their own beliefs and the rights of others. We hope you will join us in this endeavor, whoever you are and wherever you are in your life.

Finance Report: Paul reported that we will carry a balance of about \$5,600 into 2010. Member tax statements have been issued. The 2010 budget has been approved by the Finance Committee and is reflected in the updated Strategic Plan. The target for pledges for the upcoming pledge drive is \$180,000.

Old Business:

Stewardship Campaign: Bonnie will notify us via e-mail of the outcome of committee meeting tomorrow.

Chalice Lighter Grant: Updates to the Strategic Plan were approved and Paul will submit it for the grant application.

Facilities/Aesthetics: Dave reported that remodel will be complete in the next week to 10 days or so. There may be problems with next service, such as no sound. The worship space will be available for the tenant's use tomorrow. Need to decide what to store in our new space. Flooring will arrive next week and new carpet should be done by February 14. Parking after service in front of Featherheads is not allowed. Parking is available on the other side of the building.

Website: Dave Lum is the new webmaster. We need an audio tech person and an e-mail administrator.

By-Laws. Joan provided revisions and the Board identified one correction. The

final version will be approved at the next Board meeting.

Subtenant. Joan volunteered to be Board liaison with subtenant and attend meetings with Anya. She will call to introduce herself and provide contact information as well as remind them that part of the rent remains due.

Worship Arts Festival. Ken will remind Worship Associates of this event. Rev Anya is leading a workshop.

Mythica Music concert will be March 12. We need to sell tickets. Less UUS expenses, half of the ticket price is for Mythica and half for Loudon Cares. There will be a wine tasting.

Building dedication will be March 28 (Changed to May 23 [Ed.]). There will be JPD guests. Bonnie is working on ordering dishes for the new space. A wireless sound system is being ordered. New chairs will not (should [Ed.]) arrive for the dedication.

Upcoming JPD Spring Conference is April 16-17, 2010 in Valley Forge.

Youth Service will be April 25.

March Eco-Tips

This month's tips revolve around ways to eat locally produced food.

Join a CSA (community-supported agriculture group) where you pay for a share (or half share) in advance and then get a weekly delivery of (or go pick up) fresh vegetables and sometimes fruit, eggs, or flowers, depending on which CSA you join. CSAs help small local farmers by giving them a reliable source of income ahead of the harvest. You benefit by getting some great food-there's no better way to eat better than to have a bunch of veggies to use up! It's fun to see what you get every week. Some CSAs also have pick-your-own bonuses, which add to their value. Signups happen in the winter (now!), so go to localharvest.org and see what's in the area. We are lucky to have several local CSAs. Rev. Anya and I both participate in CSAs, so ask us if you have any questions.

Patronize farmers' markets. Not only are you eating seasonally (the produce is much fresher than something flown in), but you're cutting out the middleman and putting more money in the pockets of the people who actually produce your food. It's too easy to feel disconnected from the source of our food, but at farmers' markets you get to know the people who grow what we eat, and can benefit from their knowledge of their products. You can also find interesting heirloom and other less common varieties of products. The meat, cheese and eggs at farmers' markets come from animals who are more humanely treated than animals in factory farming operations. Plus, you're radically decreasing your food miles - the number of miles your food travels before getting to you.

Finally, try planting a garden! After years of saying I didn't have the time or the space, I finally planted a little one, and it was so gratifying to be able to walk out back and grab some beets or spinach.
