



## Minister's Message



At the time of writing this article, I've finished watching the Lehrer News hour coverage of the tragic event that took place yesterday with the death of 33 students at Virginia Tech University.

The coverage was as complete as a one-hour news program could offer. It dramatized the essential horror of this event. Any tragedy involving the death of 33 human beings is bad enough, but the death of so many bright young people is a particularly cruel twist. The tragedy of the young South Korean perpetrator leaves behind more questions than explanations, more grief than recriminations. We are just stunned by so many innocent deaths.

Shakespeare got it right at the tragic conclusion of King Lear, "The weight of this sad time we must obey, say what we feel not what we ought to say." Folks will rush to all sorts of explanations. The simplest thing to say is that we grieve for the parents, families, and friends mourning their dead children. No doubt we shall amplify the reasons, try to apportion the blame, strengthen campus security, and try to draw sociological and/or political conclusions. All this is valid, but in face of the actuality of such tragedy, our greatest virtue, at this point should be silence, grief, and sober reflections as to why we, as a "civil" society, are so in love with guns. This is a time for silence and national self-examination, not the knee-jerk justification of our gun culture-not just the death of these 33 young people, but the deaths of the hundreds of people –

## President's Column



This week a very disturbed young man at Virginia Tech saw fit to open fire on many of his fellow students, killing 32 and severely injuring dozens more, and in his

final act, turned the gun on himself. As I heard the devastating events unfold throughout the last few days, I found myself wondering what tragic course of events had led him down this path? Was it anger that made him act? Despair? Insanity? Was the cause of this young man's actions something of momentous importance in his life or just the latest in a series of little annoyances that served as the straw that broke the camel's back?

We like to believe that we are in total control of our lives. We want assurances that if we do the right things, live the right way, we'll be safe from tragedy. We raise our children in safe neighborhoods...we don't eat uncooked chicken or pork...we buy and drive safe vehicles...we lock our doors and often install security systems in our homes and cars. And then something like the events at Virginia Tech happen and we are confronted with the stark reality that sometimes, despite all our efforts to insulate ourselves from people and situations that threaten us, we nevertheless sometimes become victims of tragedy. When it happens, we struggle to figure out what we did wrong and what we could have done to avoid it. Often we have a hard time believing that we might have been in the wrong place at the wrong time, and instead we attribute it to Karma or to a vengeful God. It's easier, somehow, to believe

## Worship Calendar

**May 6** – "Unitarian Universalism: Roots and Branches" by Rev. Matthew. "Unitarianism" and "Universalism" merged as recently as only 50 years ago to become modern UUism. mostly in the ghettos of our great cities.

In my adopted city of Baltimore, ten times that number has died from gunshot wounds in a given year. The murder statistics in DC are about the same rate; but at Virginia Tech, there is no such human deprivation and despair. One disturbed, alienated young man simply murdered his own peers. There will be plenty of discussion as the days and months pass; relative guilt and innocence will apportioned, the story will pass from consciousness, but the national facts on the ground will remain. America, the leader of the civilized world will remain the murder capital of the civilized world. The tragedy is that after all the mandatory hand-wringing, better new security measures will be suggested, but how much genuine progress will be made? Making our society safer from these mass killings will depend on many things. But above all, a more stringent and effective control of handguns will be needed. For the moment, we pause again in the face of this tragedy as people of good will – gun owners and non-gun owners – and seek more thoughtful and effective laws with ever-greater consensus and sense of urgency. Meanwhile our profoundest condolences to the families and friends of the fine young people who died. For now, that is enough.

that God has it in for us, than to think that a seemingly regular guy could suddenly snap and go on a rampage. After all, if it could happen to any regular guy, it could happen to any of us too, right?

I will keep the victims of the Virginia Tech tragedy, and their families and friends, in my thoughts and prayers. I will also say a prayer for the gunman; that whatever pain or despair caused him to act as he did, has been put to rest. And I will say a special prayer for the family and friends of the gunman, for they, too, have lost someone, and they may be unjustly ostracized for their connection to the troubled young man.

## Ministerial Search Committee Update We Have a Candidate!

The Ministerial Search Committee of **Celinda Chandler, Rosalie Clavez, Gus Douougih, Dave Miller, Linda Reeder, and Karen Saifer** is happy and excited to announce that Anya Sammler has accepted its offer of the position of settled minister of UUS! Candidating week is scheduled for May 13 to May 20, 2007.

In mid-April the Ministerial Search Committee completed the pre-candidating phase of the search process. The term "pre-candidate" is used to distinguish it from the "candidate," who is the one ultimately presented to the congregation for a vote.

As recommended by the UUA, this phase consists of spending an entire weekend interviewing and visiting with each pre-candidate who is being seriously considered. Following these guidelines, we pre-candidated three ministers. A description of a typical weekend follows.

We meet the ministerial candidate (and spouse/partner if applicable) on a Friday afternoon and settle him/her into the hotel for a brief rest. In the early evening, we visit the church and then have dinner together. Saturday morning we hold a three-hour informal interview with the candidate and go from there to lunch. After a short afternoon break, we give a tour of the community and conclude the tour at a restaurant for dinner.

Sunday morning we travel with the candidate to a neutral pulpit in the area to hear him/her preach. In some cases, that involves two services. Afterwards, we all go to lunch together. The candidate typically departs in the early afternoon.

We discovered that unpredictable weather tested our spirit of adventure during some of the weekends. We had several logistical challenges due to bad weather conditions!

On April 15, the committee held a final evaluation meeting and unanimously selected Anya as the candidate to recommend to the congregation for a vote. The following Friday, Anya called to accept our offer.

We are elated because we were very impressed with Anya's keen intellect and rigorous theological training and in every other respect, from her pulpit presence to her sense of humor, from her commitment to social action to her expertise in RE, including adult RE, from her understanding of our UU faith to her respect for what UUS has accomplished and the challenges that lie ahead, to name just a few of her many qualities. We think she is a perfect fit for our congregation. Between now and candidating week, the congregation will learn more about Anya.

Even before we concluded the pre-candidating phase of the search process, we began to draft a candidating week schedule of events. We have communicated that very preliminary draft to the Board and to Anya, the candidate. We will submit subsequent drafts to the Board and the congregation as we receive input from the Board, the candidate and the congregation. The committee plans to address the congregation in early May to discuss the candidate more fully, as well as other matters related to candidating week.

In the meantime, we, the members of the Committee, would like to thank The Board and the entire congregation for your patience, understanding and support throughout this process. It has been a pleasure serving you, our faith community!



## From Anya Sammler, Our Ministerial Candidate

Hello. It's an honor to introduce myself, and I look forward to meeting you all soon.

I am sending this biography from Ridgewood, New Jersey – my home for the past year. I commute three days a week to White Plains, New York, where I serve the Community Unitarian Church as Youth Minister. I also serve the Community Unitarian Church of Paramus, New Jersey, teaching Adult Religious Education and leading their small group ministry. On Mondays I travel to Manhattan for theology and history classes at Union Seminary I will graduate from Meadville Lombard Theological School on June Third.

Scott, my fiancé, is fulfilling his internship at the Unitarian Society of Ridgewood. On rare occasions we have the opportunity to preach or minister together at both the Ridgewood and White Plains congregations. We are deeply involved in planning for our August 18, 2007, wedding.

Our ceremony will be held in North Branford, Connecticut, where I was born and lived for eighteen years. I am an only child and retain a deep and sustaining relationship with my parents, Laraine and Bronislaw (Ben) Sammler. Interestingly, I escaped the award of my father's namesake (Bruniswawa) when my Grandparents agreed on "Anya." My name is a compromise – satisfying my Polish roots from my father's side, and my Ukrainian roots from my mother's.

I attended college at the University of the South in Sewanee Tennessee. I was awarded degrees in philosophy and fine arts, concentrating on Wittgenstein and photography. The mix proved compelling and I developed a style of photography that sought to uncover the profound in the ordinary. For a few years after graduation I continued to exhibit work and establish my photographic voice. When I wasn't producing art I was producing food – working as both a chef and a café manager. These pursuits allowed for extensive travel and numerous opportunities for relocation.

After university I moved to Alexandria, Virginia, then back to Connecticut, then out to Portland, Oregon, then up to Seattle, Washington. From Seattle I enrolled at Meadville Lombard in Chicago. While working for my Master of Divinity I served as a Chaplain at Swedish Hospital in Seattle and as an intern Minister in Sunnyvale, California.

Physical and spiritual pursuits captivate my interest. I started young as a gymnast, went on to regional and then college varsity swimming and soccer. I even made it through one season on the men's college-traveling rugby team, incidentally as the only woman in the league. I love to hike and recall many lovely adventures in the Blue Ridge Mountains from my time in Alexandria.

Running is my favorite physical, and my most endeared spiritual practice.

While running I work through my calendar, dream up ideas for sermons, and creatively engage with topics I might otherwise forgo. Other spiritual practices involve deep breathing of a yogic variety, chanting or toning (holding constant vowels as in Buddhist and Vedic disciplines,) and simply reserving time to share with loved ones. (One of these loved ones is Scott's cat Beatnik – a well-rumpled long hair that has learned how to hug.)

In many ways my life is an open book. Ralph Waldo Emerson asked the Divinity School Graduation class of 1838 to give no less to their congregants than "their life passed through the fire of thought." I live by his admonition, and find great joy in sharing my story with you.

#### Denominational Affairs

#### Finance

We are now 75 percent of the way through the 2006-07 fiscal year. We have collected \$108,381 which is 81 percent of the total budgeted income. Year-to-date expenses are \$98,421 or about 65 percent of the budgeted amount.

In our general bank account, \$15,091 is available for general operations; \$2,886 in other funds is allocated to the remaining Chalice Lighter Grant, House Pins, Free Trade Coffee, Music, Youth Group and Social Action accounts. In our reserve accounts, \$23,494 is available for general operations and \$33,383 is in the Building Reserve funds.

#### Ministerial Search Committee

The Search Committee expects to make an offer to a candidate. Should the offer be accepted, the UUA guidelines provide that a candidating week be organized for the congregation to meet and vote on the ministerial candidate. That week consists of having the candidate spend a week with our church community, preaching two consecutive Sundays (the congregational vote takes place after the service of the second Sunday), and spending the week in-between participating in a variety of church activities and socializing with the congregation.

Subject to the candidate's approval, we propose the week of May 13 to May 20, with the candidate arriving Saturday, May 12 and leaving Sunday, May 20.

#### Social Action

The Rebuilding Together (aka Christmas in April) project has been selected for this year and the date set for April 28. A signup sheet is at the church.

Terri Glass created a "Write here, write now" project designed to make it easy for UUSers to write letters on current issues.



### ***UUS Sunday Services 10:30 AM***

**Unitarian Universalists of Sterling** meets at the Sterling Oaks Commerce Center Sterling, a handicapped accessible 24-7 facility, located on 22135 Davis Drive near Route 28 and Church Road in Sterling, Virginia. Child care and children's religious education are both provided during worship services. Dress is casual. Children are encouraged to wear play clothes.

From Northbound Route 28: Take Route 28 North exit from the Dulles Toll Road. Turn right at Church Road. Turn right on Davis Drive. Go about one block and turn right into the parking lot.

From Southbound Route 28: Take Route 28 south from Route 7. Turn left at Church Road. Turn right on Davis Drive. Go about one block and turn right into the parking lot.

From Westbound Route 7: Turn left at Sterling Boulevard. Turn right at Church Road. Go three miles. Turn left on Davis Drive. Go about one block and turn right into the parking lot.
