Faith, a Conversation

One of our congregation's members, Michael Berger, is known to say that "I do not choose my beliefs; only over time do I notice that I have them." His statement inevitably leads to an excellent conversation on freedom, choice, and fate, one that will likely invite participants to question suppositions that they once held firm. In the end even if he doesn't sway any minds, he gives them just provocation to doubt their past certainties. His rational manner reminds me of the ancient thinker Socrates whose philosophical system hinged on the fact that truth, if it is to be found, must wrestle first with doubt.

I feel that we often engage such a process whenever we speak about "faith." One simple utterance and we are plunged into a longstanding conversation we didn't create, nor will we ever finish. Here is a bit of the conversation I have known:

Dictionary: Faith is a belief in, devotion to, or trust in somebody or something, especially without logical proof.

Rev. Anya: I agree in part but don't see faith as something I hold without logical proof. I have faith in a spirit of life that connects all life – a force per se that runs through all things. I sense this and I don't believe the sensations are illogical. I might even propose they were rational – just rational on a different level than mathematics.

Friedrich Nietzsche (philosopher): “‘Faith’ means not wanting to know what is true”

Rev. Anya: Friedrich, unlike James, you are ever ready to put your foot in your mouth. And while your critique is biting, I wholly disagree. The kind of faith you are talking about is blind faith. The kind I am interested in walks hand in hand with truth – it is the kind of faith that Martin Luther King, and Gandhi had – the kind I hope I am building.

Oswald Chambers (author): “Faith is deliberate confidence in the character of God whose ways you may not understand at the time.”

Rev. Anya: Oswald, you enter into our conversation carrying the flag of one faith. Would you be willing to substitute “Spirit of Life” or the “divine wholeness of life” for your word God? I do use the word God, and I don’t see anything inherently wrong with that choice, but I wonder if faith is a larger word than you presume.

Henry David Thoreau (Transcendental Naturalist): “The smallest seed of faith is better than the largest fruit of happiness.”

Rev. Anya: My dear Thoreau, I have read and enjoyed reading your many works on nature and life. They have brought me so much happiness that I wonder why you chose to contrast faith and happiness? I am more interested in seeing how they partner in this dance of life – something they must have done for you, from time to time.

Lifespan RE Opportunities

There are still many opportunities to serve your congregation and contribute to the ministry of lifespan religious exploration and enrichment. Help build the multi-age community at UUS and ensure a meaningful RE program for the children. These are a few of the possibilities:

Lifespan Faith Development Committee Member: The committee meets once a month to plan and implement the work necessary to make the congregation's vision for religious exploration and enrichment a reality. Anyone interested in Lifespan RE at UUS is welcome. Especially needed are people with skills in organization, group facilitation, writing, creating and maintaining web pages, or planning events, and people who enjoy interacting with and contacting other people.

Children's RE Leaders for 2009-10: Lead a class at least once a month in September through June. Lesson plans are provided and the DRE is available if you have questions, need help getting resources, or would like additional ideas. Children benefit from consistency, so consider leading more than once a month!

Children's RE Assistants for 2009-10: Assist in a class once a month in September through June or a few Sundays throughout the year. You will help with set up and clean up before and after the class and help supervise children during the class. Simply being present during the class is the most crucial part of this job.

Nursery Assistants: Help watch children during the service once a month.

Other opportunities include substituting in children's RE or the nursery, helping arrange child care for special events, planning or helping with children's activities during special events, driving on field trips, or sharing your knowledge about or interest in a religion, culture, or holiday.

Together We Play: Summer RE

It may sound like all fun and games, but there may be few skills more important than learning to "play well with others." This year's summer program, Together We Play, is adapted from In Our Hands: A Peace and Social Justice Program published by the Unitarian Universalist Association. It encourages peace and justice within each individual, in relationships with others, and in relationship with the earth.

During the summer we offer one class for children in kindergarten through 6th grade. The nursery will be available for younger children. Older children and youth may attend the services or help in RE or the nursery.

Each Sunday one leader, one assistant, and one nursery helper are needed. We are also looking for one additional person each Sunday to be available to help in the nursery or RE class. Leaders will receive a lesson plan with a suggested story, one or two discussion questions, a game and a craft idea. Assistants and nursery helpers merely show up and help watch the children. Take a look at the summer schedule and let Linda Weaver know how and when you would like to help. Anti-Racism/ Multicultural Online Class - Transforming Our Whiteness

May 4 – June 5

White people don't experience the racial oppression that people of color experience. Whiteness is the norm in our society. As a result it is hard for those of us who are white to see our own white power and privilege.

In this workshop we will identify what whiteness is, clarify the ways it operates on our lives, and explore ways of transforming whiteness into a force for justice.

Whiteness is a social construct with a 500-year history. We will explore how whiteness took shape in colonial times and how it has changed over time. We will be particularly interested in the racialization of European immigrants into whiteness. We will discuss being a good ally to People of Color, working to end racism in white controlled institutions, and nurturing a positive white racial identity in our children. This course will be taught by the Rev. Melissa Carvill-Ziemer and the Rev. Bill Gardiner. They serve as co-chairs of the Unitarian Universalist Allies for Racial Equity Education Committee and lead transforming whiteness workshops for congregations and community organizations.

Treasurer's Report: Our cash flow is in good shape.

Stewardship campaign status: We are below our goal with 19 pledge units still outstanding. We believe we will make our goal.

Old Business:

Strategic Planning Committee: The group is on track for presenting a draft report at the annual meeting on May 17. Rev Anya reports they are creatively discussing the issues raised in the Cottage Conversations.

New Space: Dave reported that there is no official vacate date for the space next door, but it will be after May. We have received an estimated rent amount from Tim; it is somewhat higher than we are budgeting for. We need to meet with Tim in the next couple of weeks to begin negotiating. Karen Saifer-Ward and Gus Douguilh have agreed to be our negotiating team. The board discussed the guidelines we will give them related to cost and length of lease and agreed that a three year lease is preferable but a four year lease will be considered depending on the terms. The negotiating team will bring the final offer to the board for approval.

Girls' Choir space rental. The board agreed to charge 10 percent of the fees collected for both the summer camp and Monday's beginning in the fall. The agreement will contain a clause that lets us preempt their use if we need the space which is expected to be a rare occurrence.

Annual Meeting: Reports need to be submitted to Jeff by mid-month. The

treasurer's report should emphasize our spending rate with an estimate for the rest of the year. Reports should be submitted by the President, Vice President, Treasurer, Director of Religious Education, and the minister. At-large members may submit reports for their committees.

New Business:

Board Transition meeting: The date had been set for June 13, but that conflicts with the Women's Retreat which is scheduled for that weekend. The new date for the transition is the July board meeting, which is July 1. Rev Anya let us know she will not be at this meeting. The retreat will be Saturday, July 18.

Volunteer Fest: This display of committee activity will be held on two Sundays: April 19 and May 3. The Finance Committee and the Board will also be represented. The board won't be recruiting as much as sharing what we do. But we can recruit for a facilities committee. Paul will coordinate for the finance committee. Dave will be there on the 19th for the board and Bonnie will be there on the 3rd.

Requests for assistance procedures: Rev Anya has a discretionary fund which she can use to help people in need but she would prefer that we have a policy to provide a framework. Linda Reeder will work with Rev Anya to draft a policy. The board decided that 5th Sunday collections will supplement Rev Anya's discretionary fund.

JPD Leadership Development. The JPD is offering grants of up to \$2000 for leadership training. We see this as a way to encourage and assist new members in attending leadership training workshops. Paul and Belinda will review the information and draft a proposal.

Calendar Review:

April 25th is Rebuilding Together day. We have been given a house in Bluemont. The bathroom walls need repair and the roof of a connected shed is leaking. Ken is leading the effort with help from Linda and Belinda. The current level of UUS participation is low. Linda will make a big signup sheet and make an announcement next Sunday.

May 17th is Charter Day, Membership

Sunday, and our Annual Meeting.
