President's Message



Retreat!

No, this is not the new long-range plan of UUS, so anyone conjuring visions of knights running away from the castle in "Monty Python and the Holy

Grail" can stop now... I am referring instead to the recent UUS Board retreat with Rev. Anya.

One of the many reasons I became a Unitarian Universalist is our tradition of and respect for congregational polity, which at this church involves as much transparency and openness as reasonably possible. With that in mind, I would like to use this column as an opportunity to report on some of the outcomes of the Board retreat as they pertain to the direction of the church.

The ultimate goal Rev. Anya set out for the retreat was to develop a priority-ordered set of tasks for the Board to achieve in the first year of her ministry. In order to accomplish this goal, we first had to establish a set of high level "idea goals" for the church. We came up with quite a few, but the ones that seemed to resonate most with the Board and Rev. Anya were the following three.

Make UUS a church community that cares for itself.

As I indicated last month, the ability of UUS to be a caring community during its interim period fell off somewhat, which was a regrettable, if understandable, consequence of losing full-time ministry. Now that we have regained that ministry, facilitating the reestablishment of pastoral and congregational care has to be the top (Continued on page 2)

priority of the Board this year.

If any of us experiences misfortune or conflict, be it with respect to UUS, family, career, health, or whatever, this church must have the ability to provide comfort and support, both in the person of Rev. Anya and in the personal involvement of members of the congregation. This must be the case even if circumstances cause us to be absent from the church – no, actually, this must be the case *especially* if circumstances cause us to be absent from the church.

Make UUS a church community that knows what it really believes in.

I admit that this is a personal favorite of mine. I am irritated by the argument that Unitarian Universalism is a philosophical system rather than a religious system. If we are the former, then we can't honestly be called a church or expect the kind of spiritual connection and support being a church implies. If we fail to be the latter, then it can only be the result of our timidity and lack of imagination.

What I believe in, and what I believe can be shared by even a diverse church community such as ours, is that there is a common unifying aspect of religion that we can discover together and worship universally, regardless of our individual philosophical take on religion. To facilitate this discovery, a crucial task for the Board must be to ensure that Religious Exploration is vibrant, active, and *intergenerational* (read: RE isn't just for the kids anymore).

Make UUS a church community that its members and visitors love spiritually.

Having a church community that cares for itself and knows what it believes in means little if we are unsuccessful at feeding our collective and individual spirits through meaningful and enjoyable worship.

In order to thrive — I've stopped thinking of growth as a goal, incidentally: If we grow we won't necessarily thrive, but if we thrive, we will grow — UUS must improve and enliven its worship experience.

We all know how spiritually restorative a good service is – the Board's task this year is to do what it can to make sure as many people in the congregation experience that restorative sense as often as possible. Beyond that, we are committed to ensure that our sense of positive community and worship extend to our visitors who, after all, are our future members.

If, as you've been reading this column, you're thinking "Okay, but what is the Board actually going to do specifically?" – that's a fair question, but not one I'm prepared to answer at the moment. For one thing, if I did, we wouldn't have room in the newsletter for anything else. For another thing, we haven't yet decided on the specifics.

We have a lot of possible actions to consider, and, with your help, it will be the business of the Board and Rev. Anya in the following months to decide which of those actions will best address the idea goals described herein while carefully managing the resources of the church. Stay tuned!

Religious Exploration

Religious Exploration (RE) started with leader and assistant orientation at the beginning of September. A great group attended, and Deb Rose had everyone thinking about ways to include children with differing abilities in RE. This highly motivated group stayed beyond the scheduled time discussing their plans. It should be an exciting and fun year!

The first day of Religious Exploration classes was indeed full of activity and enthusiasm. The Kindergarten through third grade class listened to a story, sang songs, made their own "super hero" capes and talked about how they can be heroes by helping at home. They will continue to explore heroism this year as they are introduced to people in Hebrew and Christian Bible stories and are encouraged to use their own "super powers." The fourth through seventh grade class made a timeline and began to gain perspective on the history of stories from various world religions. Throughout the year, discussion of these stories and a variety of crafts will aid in forming a deeper understanding of world religions, reinforce the UU living traditions, and provide perspective in evaluating religious claims.

To further explore how Unitarian Universalists put their beliefs to work, children in kindergarten through seventh grade will meet together once a month for Social Action Sunday. The theme of the first Social Action Sunday was stream monitoring. Scott Findley shared his experiences and knowledge of stream monitoring and provided music for the class session. Activities introduced children to stream monitoring and helped them explore the importance of conserving water and keeping streams clean. Throughout the year, other adults from the congregation will share how they work to make the world a better place through involvement in a social action project or social justice issue. On the next Social Action Sunday the children will take part in Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF.

UNICEF and Halloween Party

On October 28, the children will talk about Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF and celebrate Halloween. Money raised through Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF aids children around the world by providing items such as medicine, clean water and school supplies. Help your children identify people to visit or encourage them to find other ways to raise money. Return the UNICEF boxes to church by November 11 or donate the money to UNICEF yourself at a Coinstar^R machine, online, or by phone. Sign Up for Covenant Groups

Small Group Ministry has been keeping UUS members and friends connected and engaged in the life of the church for many years. By providing mid-week activities, small groups permit and encourage connections, growth and friendship for all participants, but especially for those who are not able to attend services every week. It is our hope that every single member and friend of this congregation will experience the intimacy, caring, support, and stimulation of a small group at UUS.

Covenant Groups are designed to help UUS Members and Friends maintain that sense of intimacy as congregation grows. In a Covenant Group, you will, over time, develop a close bond with a small group of people, sharing experiences from your personal lives, as well as reflecting together on ethical, spiritual and religious questions. Covenant Groups do not take the place of Sunday morning worship, but do augment and strengthen that shared experience. People come to church seeking to know themselves better, to grow in their understanding of the world and to ponder the age old questions of

The topics of Covenant Groups have varied over the years. For several years, they were themed so that each month the discussion built on the previous session. One year we chose articles from *UU World* magazine for our topics. This year, Rev Anya will be preparing topics. We are expecting a very interesting year!

How I See It

The following letter was written by Mary Matheny and appeared in the Culpeper Star Exponent, where it was sure to be seen by people who knew Victoria Burke.

On September 1, my husband and I were driving home from the Madison County Taste of the Mountains Festival and came upon an accident that had just occurred at the intersection of U.S. 29 and Alanthus Road. We were headed north and were probably the second car that passed by the accident immediately after it happened.

We stopped to see if there was anything we could do. The two people in the truck, a young man and woman, were seriously hurt. A nurse that was passing in a car going south came over and took their pulses. Then she went to help the young man that was thrown into the median strip.

At that point the girl was breathing, but not often and her breathing was very shallow. I think that the young man had already passed on. The emergency personnel had not arrived as yet.

At the time that I was standing there, I felt a real connection with the young girl. Maybe it's because I have a young daughter myself. I was thinking how beautiful she was and how terrible it was going to be for her loved ones to have to deal with such a terrible and tragic event. People came and went to where I was - a policeman, my husband, another passerby - but then moved on to see if they could help with the ones who had survived.

As I stood there I decided that I needed to stay and for some reason I felt her spirit around me. She stopped breathing after a few minutes. She looked so beautiful and seemed to go in peace.

I really feel that our spirits are all intertwined and that sometimes in this world they connect, and I could feel a sense of her spirit there, connecting with me, at that time. I didn't want to leave her alone, so I stayed there with her until the medics arrived.

I am writing this because, as a mother, I think that under such tragic circumstances - if it were my daughter - it would be really important for me to know that at the time of her passi

Start-Up Workshop with Our New Minister: October 20th

What is a ministerial start-up? It is a very important time of focused conversation with our new minister, congregational leaders, and members to establish priorities and goals for the first year of our new ministerial relationship. The Joseph Priestley District of the UUA provides facilitation for such events, bringing to the conversation information of how congregations and ministers achieve positive working relationships. Our facilitator will be the Rev. Melora Lynngood, who has also been a guest preacher for us several times over the past two years.

Why should you participate? Because the importance of this process deserves your time and attention, because your voice matters to your new minister, and because congregations who invest the time tend overwhelmingly to enjoy more satisfying and longer lasting ministerial relationships. Please come!

Preparation question to ponder: Please remember a time when you have felt ministered to. (For the purpose of this exercise, try first to think of a time that you felt ministered to by a professional minister and you just felt, "Wow, I felt ministered to." But if you have not had that experience (yet), then think about any time you have felt that someone ministered to you.) What was going on in the interchange? What were the qualities of the relationship that allowed that to happen? How did you feel about it? We will use your answers in an exercise during the workshop.

Third Annual Joseph Priestly District Racial Justice Conference

Saturday, October 27, 2007; 9:30 a.m.–8:00 p.m. at the UU Congregation of Fairfax, 2709 Hunter Mill Road in Oakton

This day-long conference will offer inspiration and a variety of practical tools and resources for moving our UU congregations toward being Anti-Racist and Anti-Oppressive, Welcoming, and more diverse communities.

Professor Sherrilyn Ifill, Professor of Law at the University of Maryland Law School, will be the featured speaker. Professor Ifill is nationally recognized as an advocate in the areas of civil rights, voting rights, judicial diversity and judicial decision-making. Her book, *On the Courthouse Lawn: Confronting the Legacy of Lynching in the 21st Century,* was released by Beacon Books in February 2007.

There will be various workshops, videos, an example of transformative worship led by local ministers, and discussions.

Changing the practices that reinforce inequality is hard, especially when they are invisible to those in power. Because everything about race is loaded, even opening our eyes to racial injustice (and what we are not doing to stop it) is a powerful step towards living into our humanity and enabling ourselves to work for the changes that are possible.

We urge as many UUS leaders and members as possible to take advantage of this opportunity. You are invited to stay for dinner followed by a concert by the Jubilee Singers of All Souls Church, Unitarian from Washington DC.

<u>Building Your Own Theology – Volume 3, Ethics</u>

Led by Rev. Anya Sammler-Michael

This course draws on the concept of the "Moral Compass," identifying eight modes of ethical decision-making. Case studies and conversation will allow us to explore the processes, values, and theologies that we rely on to make difficult moral and ethical decisions.

Cost

All Adult Religious Exploration offerings cost \$5 per session per person. This donation will pay for food, drink, and supplies. Any additional money will be held in the Adult Religious Education account and may, in the future, cover the cost of guest educators. All payment is due on the first class session.

Inclusion Resource Team

Deb Rose is forming an Inclusion Resource Team. Members of this group are available to lay leaders and the adults and children of the congregation. They will support children and adults in their endeavor to fully participate in the life of UUS. They can provide information, resources and support to lay leaders to help them better serve all our members, friends, and visitors. They are also available to provide information or identify resources for children and adults experiencing their own or a family member's special needs.

Deb Rose is a valuable resource at UUS. She received her physical therapy degree from Upstate Medical Center in Syracuse, New York. She has been practicing for 24 years, the last 13 with the Fairfax County Public Schools. As a school-based pediatric physical therapist, she supports children with a variety of abilities to fully participate in their educational program with their peers. She utilizes a family-centered care approach, supporting parents and families. She is very active in Girl Scouting and is currently a council trainer. She co-chairs the inclusion task force at the Girl Scout Council of the Nation's Capital in Washington, DC and serves as a resource to leaders, parents, and girls. She is a student at Drexel University and will receive her clinical doctorate in pediatric physical therapy in June of 2008.

If you have experience in this area that you would like to share, serve as a resource on the team, or if you have questions, please contact Deb. If any member of your family has mobility, vision, hearing or learning challenges or any other special need, let us know how we can best serve her or him.

Welcoming Everyone

People often feel awkward when meeting someone with different abilities. Here are a few suggestions that may ease the awkwardness.

- Use a normal tone of voice. Don't raise your voice unless asked to do so.
- Offer to shake hands. Using your left hand is acceptable, especially if that is the hand the person offers.
- Look directly at the person, not an aide or parent who may be accompanying her or him.
- If the person uses an interpreter, converse and maintain eye contact with the speaker, not the interpreter.
- Consider a wheelchair to be part of a person's personal space. Do not lean on it or attempt to move it unless specifically asked to do so by that person.
- Ask before offering help. If the person wants assistance, ask how you can help. Do not assume you know what is needed.
- If a person with a visual impairment wishes to be guided, allow her or him to take your arm just above the elbow.


